6.3.1 Curriculum Development

As the college is affiliated to Manipur University, the institution follows the curriculum provided by the University. When the University invited for participating <u>Curriculum</u> <u>Enrichment committee meeting</u>, the college sends representatives for sharing the discussion.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- Modern teaching and learning tools have been provided to the faculty to implement in the class room teaching.

- Kakching Khunou College Research Journal is published half yearly by the Research and Development Committee of the college.

Annexure: II

Students' Feedback System

1. Objective:

- To bridge the communication gap between students and teachers. Also to strength teaching learning process.
- To provide an opportunity to teachers for improving their teaching skills.
- To get suggestions from students about teachers and various facilities provided to them.

2. The Context:

- Sometimes teachers may not know how to convey the concepts to the students. In that case teaching becomes less effective unless the matters are brought to the notice of the teachers concerned he/she can't bring necessary changes into his/her teaching style. This is why 'Students' Feedback system came into existence.
- Students are also given opportunity to resources provided by the college. To utilize these facilities suggestions from students are very useful.

3. The Practice:

- a) Feedback is conducted once a semester of the middle of the semester.
- **b)** The feedback is taken manually through a questionnaire. The co-ordinator of IQAC is responsible for arranging the process with the co-ordination of Heads of the Departments.
- c) Students are presented with a questionnaire which they answer selecting appropriate options. Comments and suggestions from students are also entertained.
- d) H.O.Ds and the principal check the feedback report and discuss the various aspects.

4. Evidence of Success:

After receiving the feedback a teacher comes to know about the areas he/she is logging. He/she then makes necessary improvements.

5. Future Plans:

To conduct feedback twice a semester to change from manual to online system.

Objectives of Remedial Coaching:-

- To give more help and support for the show learners.
- To pay individual attention to the low achiever in the class.
- To rise their level of comprehensions of basic subjects.
- To provide a stronger foundation for further academic work.

Context:-

Most the students of this college are coming from rural and hilly areas belonging to scheduled castes, scheduled Tribes and other backward classes having different family backgrounds with different living standards. The college has been facing certain challenges which are of upmost importance. It is a challenging task for the management and faculty to ensure optimal participation in the remedial classes with such a varied range of student profile. As the number of student of students is large, it is a difficult task in the criteria of selection. Usually selection is based on slow learners and S.C. and S.T.

The Practice:

- S.Cs. and S.Ts. are recognized as the most backward groups who need special protection and proper upliftment.
- The general candidates are also allowed to avail the facilities with some nominal monthly fees. However, physically challenged students and the students coming from families with income below the poverty line are exempted from paying the fee.
- Coaching classes are held after the routine time table.
- Tutorial classes are taken according to the requirements of the students.
- Revisions of important and difficult topics are made.

Evidence of success:

Students show improvements in academic performance and at University examinations. The pass percentages have increased to a great extent. The failure rate and dropout rate has decreased tremendously.
